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APPENDIX.

BUDAWANG RANGE NATIONAL PARK PROPOSAL.

Our Society received a request for the support of a renewed proposal from the National Parks association for the dedication of BUDAWANG National Park.

We quote from a report by Colin Watson in the National Parks Journal:

"10 - 40 miles inland from the coast between Nowra and Bateman's Bay lies a large area of rough, scenic, undeveloped country. Already in 1962 the N.P.A. submitted a national park proposal to the Government. Nothing happened until the Nat. Parks & Wildlife Service was established in 1967. Then a proposal was put forward by the Service to extend the Morton National Park to cover much of this area. The additions would extend on the southern side of the Shoalhaven to include the spectacular gorge country (e.g. Ettrema Gorge) between Shoalhaven River and the Nowra-Braidwood Road over Sassafras Mountain, and would continue to the south to include parts of the Budawang Range and the head of the Clyde Valley. This would create a park of about 300,000 acres - a very worthwhile size. We are still waiting for this to be implemented, but we believe it to be close.

"The area of the Budawang Range we look like getting as a park initially is far short of what is desirable. It will include much of the scenic Rim country around The Castle and extend to the west around the Corang River and Corang Peak, but it will exclude most of the valleys, particularly the Clyde Valley, as these are forested and could supply a timber or wood chip industry. Also, much desirable country is held by the Commonwealth as an Artillery Range, and there is little hope of obtaining any of that at this stage. However, a small park is better than no park, and is also a nucleus to which surrounding areas may be added at a later date. (Under the Act a new park proposal has to go before Parliament, but additions can be made by proclamation in the Government Gazette - a much easier process)."

Suggestion to prospective visitors to the area: make base-camp at Tanderra where there is plenty of open space, timber and water. The road in has recently been improved; walks can be taken from there; the route passes a patch of rainforest in which may be seen, besides other things, good examples of possum wood (*Quintinia sieberi*), a tree which starts life as a parasite on tree ferns. There is an easy climb on to Quilty's Mountain which leads on to an aboriginal bora ground where stones have been laid out in patterns over a large area of bare rock. Endrick Trig. station is on Quilty's Mtn, from where extensive view can be obtained.

There is also Little Forest Trig station, frequently visited by naturalists for observing birdlife. From there fine views of Talerang and Pidgeon House Mountain can be had. Its ruggedness, peace and scenic beauty have attracted bushwalkers for considerable time. From the Pacific Highway the top of Pidgeon House Mtn. just shows up as a glimpse. From the coast it can be seen better. Pidgeon House Mtn was named by Captain Cook as he sailed up the coast on his momentous journey of 1770."

This is an exciting proposal for a great reserve. On the coast is Cudmirrah reserve, bordered by Conjola State Forest (luckily still a Eucalyptus forest); further inland a few smaller state-forests and at the South Termeil State Forst; at the north Morton National Park.

The creation of Budawang National Park would be a great stride to one big natural area. Our Society stongly supports the N.P.A. proposal; a few brochures are available at the Hut on the Budawang National Park.
