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## THE ELECTIONS.

This newsletter is being printed early in order to reach you before the Council elections, so that you may scrutinize the answers received from the Candidates in Wards 3 and 4, and the Mayoral candidates to our questionnaire. A quick summary of the answers appears in the tables following. The questions asked were;

- 1. Will you support the appointment of an Environmental Officer within the next term of Council?
- 2. To what extent will you allow changes to the Local Environment Plan No. 4 to prohibit extractive industries under Rural zonings?
- 3. What do you consider to be the most important problem on the Blue Mountains, and how would you deal with it?
- 4. Who should have the final say in Planning or Policy mattersaldermen or Council Staff?
- 5. What criteria should be used in limiting further residential development?
- 6. How would you achieve a more attractive highway to visitors?
- 7. What would you do to create employment opportunities in the Mountains?

Our Press releases recently will explain some of the reasons behind the questions, though most are self evident. However a few comments are appropriate.

Question 1. Elaine Kaldy does not want an Environmental Officer appointed to Council for fear that his/her reports will not be available to the public. She seeks State/Federal funding for the position. See table. The Lower Blue Mountains Conservation Society, in its submissions to Council on this matter, has asked that the officer's reports be made public and has also had talks with Bob Debus and the D.E.P. on the latter question of State aid.

Question 2. The joint meeting of Local Conservation Societies with the Colong Committee aggreed that local quarries needed to remain, but that all other mining for export outside the BMCC should cease to be a

all other mining for export outside the BMCC should cease to be a permissable use under L.E.P. No. 4.

Question 4. There is a need for a STRONG direction from Aldermen, (Our representatives), and strong leadership to ensure Council staff do not have sole determination over where money is spent in the Mts.

Environment protection (ie. Environmental officer) must be given greater priority in Council budget.

Question 5. N.B. some candidates do not see residential growth as a problem.

Question 6. The L.B.M.C.S. saw that tree planting and maintaining bushland areas between villages as a means of making the highway more attractive, along with Signs suited to the image of a "city in a NATIONAL PARK".

Question 7. Where would light industry be sited?

It had been proposed to drop leaflets in letter boxes in both Wards, listing candidates with conservation policies. However, due to the massive task presented for a few willing workers, it was decided not to proceed.

## SAD LOSS.

It is with regret that I record that Wendy Godfrey has resigned as Secretary of the Society. For more than four years now, Wendy has extended herself beyond the ordinary role of Secretary, bringing to the position a zest and increasing skill that has set higher and higher standards for the Lower Blue Mountains Conservation Society.

However, the executive need your support, on a personal basis. What about feedback, sessions of encouragement, comment. Contact and nuturing from members is vital for the Society to maintain a healthy outlook for the future.

"Our experience has found that if political activity ever fails to attend to the personal and group needs of the activists, it leads to factions, individualism, excessive self criticism and sensitivity, or high levels of burn out. How ever creative or "right" a political project might be, it will not sustain personal energies and nuture activists unless it is supportive, united, has strong cohesive relationships and good open communications and a secure, reliable supportive base to regroup, reorganize and rest. If the group offers these opportunities and room for political development and is fun at least part of the time it will take care of ourselves and we in turn will take care of the political issues."
