of walk surveys, which is good.


Fire Hazard Reduction Programme for 1993

If you are concerned about this keep an eye out for any exhibition dates advertised in the Council Communicator section of The Gazette. Or contact Bushfire Control at Council and ask to see the proposals submitted by the brigades. These are mapped and every proposal is accompanied by a form which justifies the application and has details of objectives and constraints. We need to take some responsibility and interest in the bushfire ethic, it will only improve with the input of informed people. At the moment a technical officer is employed and is collating a fire history of every area. The result will provide a firmer framework for future activity.

Plant Nursery

Land Buy-back
There has always been a strong commitment in the Society to buying back
land of high conservation value to preserve it from exploitation. We are
still awaiting a decision from the Minister of the Environment on our
offer to contribute to the purchase of an in-holding in the KanangraBoyd National Park. There is an Australian Bush Heritage Fund which is

BLUE MOUNTAINS FOR WORLD HERITAGE
Members of the UBMCS Management Committee were invited to the Council
Chambers on 17/4/93 to ameeting in support of the World Heritage listing
for the Blue Mountains. Speakers were the Mayor (the Hon Mr Bob Clarke)
Mr Mylo Dunphy and Dr David Hughes of CHANGE. Representatives of Green
Groups were invited to contribute but at such short notice most referred
to their group philosophies and environmental action. Dr Hughes spoke
of the threat to the rivers and plains from floods and sewage. The area
threatened is extensive, ranging from the Shoalhaven to the Hawkesbury.
Both visiting speakers advocated the nomination of the Blue Mountains
for World Heritage listing as a means of providing 'muscle' in the fight
against over-development of the area.

# THE FINAL OPENING OF THE HUT

The John Buki Garden was officially dedicated by the minister for the Environment, the Hon. Chris Hartcher, on April 30 1993. This was also the occasion for the official opening of the Conservation Hut. Some of those attending were Barry Morris our State member, the Mayor (the Hon. Bob Clarke, Aldermen Carol Gaul and Peter Byrne, Reinis Zusters the artist whose work covers two walls of the Hut, the architect Nigel Bell, NPWS stalf in force, members of the UBMCS and honoured guest Mrs Buki.

The minister gave a brief and well-informed history of the old Conservation Hut, recalling the existence of an early sign which read "Let us be thankful". Those of us who attended were indeed thankful that the Minister represented the Society's role in the conservation movement so faithfully in his speech Our President, Mr Thor Schache replied by acknowledging with thankfulness the vision of the architect, saying that the building and gardens would provide a place in which knowledge and care of the natural environment would be enhanced. Thor was then asked to assist in placing a Time Capsule in the wall. This includes newspapers, history of the original Hut, Grace Bayley's sketch, and some microfilm provided by NPWS.

Mrs Buki unveiled the beautiful stone memorial to John Buki in the garden and Reg Toseland told of the important role John had played in the foundation of this Society and in the acquiring of the old Hut.




BOURKE NYNGAN ROAD
